



Mary Seacole 1805-1881

Mary Seacole was a doctress, an entrepreneur and an adventurer. Born Mary Jane Grant in Kingston, Jamaica in 1805 of Creole and Scottish parentage she was an extraordinary woman. A lady who rose above prejudice to help hundreds of soldiers on the front line in the Crimean war with her expert herbal treatments, compassion and her indefatigable spirit. Mary's achievements were recognized by Queen Victoria and the Surgeon General of the British Army as well as ordinary soldiers, who would stop 'Mother Seacole' in the street to offer their thanks.

Her memory has since faded. We feel that it is time she is commemorated with a memorial in the grounds of St. Thomas' Hospital, the first of its kind to a named black woman in the United Kingdom.

We believe that it will acknowledge the important role played by ethnic minorities in British history and the success of our multi-cultural society. Above all we want to celebrate a woman who succeeded against all the odds. The artist Martin Jennings has been chosen to design the Mary Seacole Memorial Statue – an example of his work is the Sir John Bejeman statue at St Pancras railway station in London. Lambeth Council have granted planning permission.



To realize this wonderful opportunity, to celebrate our past and inspire future generations, we need your help!

We need to raise just under £342,000 to fund the memorial as we have already raised over £158,000 in donations.
